Location

Located between Washington's dramatic Cascade mountain range and the Puget Sound at the north end of Lake Sammamish about fifteen miles east of Seattle, Redmond is on the northeast terminus of SR 520.

Qualities

Known for its natural beauty, the city is unique in that residents have access to 34 parks and over 25 miles of trails, but can also reach downtown Seattle in 20 minutes. Redmond also hosts live music, film, theater and a variety of other arts for every taste. Outdoor sculpture can be seen throughout the city.

City Government Structure

Redmond is a non-charter code city, operating under Section 35A of the Revised Code of Washington with a strong Mayor/Council, non-partisan form of government. The Mayor and seven Councilmembers are all elected directly by the people. The Mayor is elected for a four-year term and the Council are elected at-large for staggered four-year terms.

Mayor, as chief executive officer of the City, directs the administrative functions of City government, develops the budget and maintains public health, safety and welfare.

Executive Department

Provides Mayoral leadership to City departments and administration; coordinates the City Budget; facilitates regional cooperation, issues analysis and policy; implements the policies and ordinances of the City Council and manages Board and Commission appointments. Ogden, Murphy, Wallace has acted as legal counsel for the City of Redmond since 1980.

Files and prosecutes adult offender cases in Northeast District Court as well as code violation cases prepared by the Code Compliance Officer before the Hearing Examiner. WHAT: Opportunity for anyone to speak to the Mayor and Council on any topic
WHEN: At the beginning of each City Council business meeting (first and third Tuesdays)
WHERE: City Hall Council Chambers

THINGS TO KNOW:

- Sign-up on sheet inside the Council Chambers entry
- Meetings are televised and your name and address is required and will be spoken on TV as part of the official record and posted on the website
- Speaking time limit is four (4) minutes
- Light will flash when your time is up

WHAT: Call, email or arrange to meet with any of your elected officials to voice your opinion on any topic

WHEN: Anytime

THINGS TO KNOW:

- Councilmembers are unable to talk or receive comments about issues they may need to rule on in a quasi-judicial setting
- No more than three Councilmembers can speak on any one topic (even if it is done separately) outside of an official, publicly noticed meeting. To do so is a violation of Washington State's Open Meeting Act

Community Meetings

WHAT: Meeting or event on a specific topic voluntarily sponsored by the City to inform, educate or receive feedback from interested residents and businesses

WHEN: as needed

WHERE: locations will vary and are posted on meeting notice

THINGS TO KNOW:

- Meetings are noticed in a variety of ways depending on the scope of the meeting. They include Focus on Redmond magazine, Redmond Reporter and other area newspapers, posters, City website, RCTV community message board and direct mailings.
- Meetings take many forms depending on the topic, such as
 - Open house/talk to staff one-on-one
 - Presentation and Q & A
 - Information sharing and feedback
- Regardless of meeting type, comments are always encouraged
- Meetings are for information gathering and are not required nor are they quasi-judicial in nature

Public Hearings

Please Note: The following information refers to types of permits (Type I, Type II, etc) and types of hearings (quasi-judicial, legislative, etc) other terms that are defined on page 10.

Public Hearings are held to receive public comment on important issues and/or issues requiring a public hearing by State statute. Citizens wishing to comment may speak after being recognized. After all persons have spoken, the hearing is closed to public comment. The decision-making body (Hearing Examiner, Council, etc) then proceeds with its deliberation and decision-making.

Hearing Examiner Public Hearing – Quasi-judicial

WHAT: The Hearing Examiner public hearing process is designed to:

- Separate the application of land use regulations (performed by Hearing Examiner) from the planning and policy-making (performed by City staff and officials)
- Provide a level of expertise to conduct administrative and quasi-judicial hearings
- Protect and promote the interests of the community
- Expand the principles of fairness and due process in public hearings

WHEN: Schedule determined by projects

WHERE: City Hall Council Chambers

THINGS TO KNOW:

- Sign-up sheet is located at entrance to Council Chambers
- Name and address of the person testifying is requested and may become part of the official record and may be posted on the City's website
- All public hearings are publicly noticed
- Notices are mailed to all property owners and residents within 500 feet and any interested parties and Parties of Record a minimum of 21 calendar days before the hearing
- Hearings are noticed through Seattle Times, City website, RCTV community message board, posted in City Hall and Redmond Library, and on the project site if applicable
- Hearing Examiner makes decisions on appeals of Type I and II administrative decisions, Type III permits including Preliminary Plats, Reasonable Use Exceptions (private), Shoreline Conditional Use permits, Shoreline Variances and Variances
- Hearing Examiner makes recommendations to City Council on Type IV permits including Planned and Master Planned Residential Developments (PRD/MPRD), Planned and Master Planned Commercial Developments (PCD/MPCD), Conditional Use Permits, Zoning Map Amendments that do not require a change to the Comprehensive Plan and Essential Public Facility permits
- Appeals of Hearing Examiner decisions:
 - Decisions on appeals of Type I and II decisions may be appealed to City Council. Decisions on SEPA appeals may only be appealed to Superior Court. *(recommendations to Council cannot be appealed)*
 - Type III decisions may be appealed to City Council with the exception of Shoreline Conditional Use Permits and Shoreline Variances, which may be appealed to the State Shoreline Hearings Board

Planning Commission Public Hearing – Legislative or Quasi-judicial

WHAT: The Planning Commission public hearing process is used to gather public comments on broad planning policy issues, including proposals to adopt and amend the Comprehensive Plan and the Community Development Guide (zoning code).

WHEN: Schedule determined by topic

WHERE: City Hall Council Chambers

THINGS TO KNOW:

- Sign-up sheet is located at entrance to Council Chambers
- The name and address of the person testifying is required and becomes part of the official record, may be posted on the City’s website and is cablecast on RCTV 21.
- Must sign-in to testify
- The time for testifying is limited to 4 minutes
- All hearings are publicly noticed
- For legislative decisions concerning changes to the Zoning Map, notices must be mailed to all property owners/residents within 500 feet and any interested parties a minimum of 21 calendar days before the hearing
- Hearings are noticed through Seattle Times, City website, RCTV community message board and posted in City Hall and Redmond Library
- The Planning Commission conducts the public hearing on Type VI reviews and makes recommendations to City Council on proposals to amend the Comprehensive Plan and/or Community Development Guide
- The City Council makes the final decision on Type VI proposals
- City Council decisions may only be appealed to Superior Court
- To be notified about a specific public hearing and become an interested party:

City Council Public Hearing – Legislative or Quasi-judicial*

WHAT: City Council holds public hearings for Type IV and Type V reviews and may schedule a public hearing for Type VI reviews

WHEN: Schedule determined by topic

WHERE: City Hall Council Chambers

THINGS TO KNOW:

- Sign-up sheet is located at entrance to Council Chambers
- The name and address of the person testifying is required and becomes part of the official record, may be posted on the City’s website and is cablecast on RCTV 21.
- Must sign-in to testify
- Time for testifying is limited to 4 minutes
- All public hearings are publicly noticed
- Hearings are noticed through Seattle Times, City website, RCTV community message board and posted in City Hall and Redmond Library
- If appropriate, notices are mailed to all property owners/residents within 500 feet and any interested parties a minimum of 21 calendar days before the hearing
- City Council decisions may be appealed to Superior Court
- To be notified about a specific public hearing and become an interested party:
 - Contact the Planning department, planning@redmond.gov or 425-556-2421, and ask to be included on the mailing list

***NOTE:**

Whenever a quasi-judicial matter pending before the City Council has been the subject of a Hearing Examiner or Planning Commission Public Hearing, only one speaker from each side is allowed to speak at the City Council Public Hearing for up to 10 minutes only. No new evidence may be presented by either speaker.

Definitions

Administrative Review – Decisions made by the appropriate City staff

EXAMPLE: Application to build a new commercial building

Legislative Review – Articulates values and standards, designates rules or creates maps that are likely to affect all or a significant part of the population

EXAMPLE: Amend a map in the City's Comprehensive Plan

Quasi-judicial Review – Has a partly judicial character by possession of the right to hold hearings on and conduct investigations into disputed claims and alleged infractions of rules and regulations and to make decisions in a matter which directly impacts individual or group property rights as opposed to a whole community's rights.

EXAMPLE: Application for a variance to the Community Development Guide to build within established set-backs (addition of garage to home)

Interested Party – An interested person who contacts the Development Services Center by phone or email and requests to receive all notices for a specific hearing

NOTE: An interested party is not a Party of Record and cannot request reconsideration of the Hearing Examiner's recommendation or decision or appeal the decision to the City Council

Party of Record – An interested person who has testified or submitted written testimony to express their views at the Public Hearing or has submitted written comments (email is acceptable) to the Development Services Center by the stated date

NOTE: Only Parties of Record have the right to request reconsideration of the Hearing Examiner's recommendation or decision or appeal the decision to the City Council

City Information Provided to the Community

Focus on Redmond – quarterly newsmagazine mailed directly to residents and businesses
Provides information on City services, programs and issues

Legal Notices – alert the community to opportunities for public comment and/or hearings on issues affecting their neighborhoods. Depending upon the proposal, legal notices may be posted on site, mailed to properties/residents within 500 feet, published in the City's official newspaper (Seattle Times), at the Library, City Hall and on the City's website.

Postings – Special meeting notices, public hearing notices, Council meeting notices and other timely information is posted in the City Hall lobby and the Redmond Library

Press releases – sent out to area media and posted and archived on the City's website

Property Notification Signs – covered under Legal Notices

City Council Actions

The City Council's role is to establish City law and policy by passing resolutions and ordinances.

City Resolutions

Resolutions are adopted to express Council policy or to direct certain types of administrative action. A resolution may be changed by adoption of a subsequent resolution.

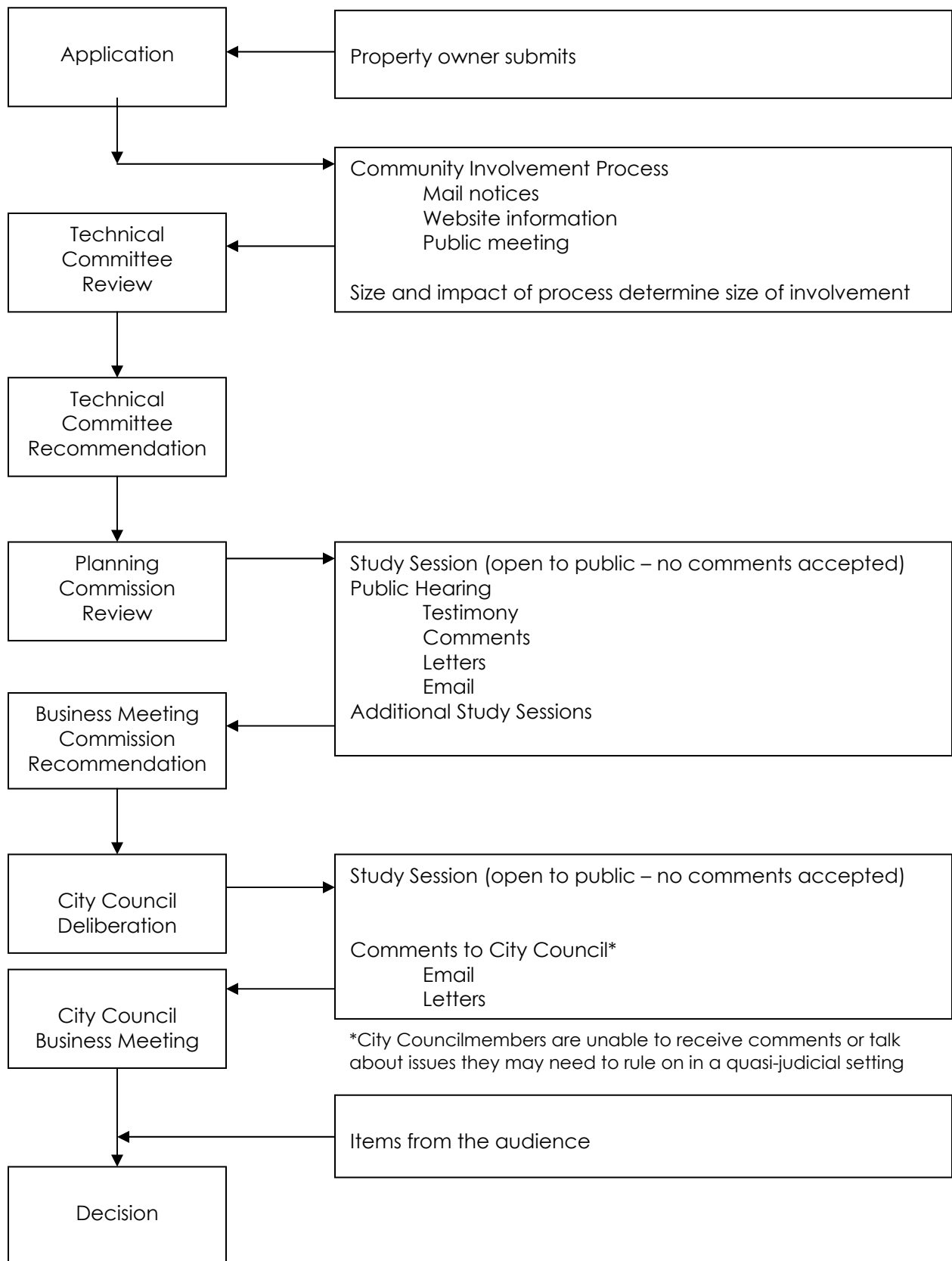
City Ordinances

City Ordinances are legislative acts or local laws. They are the most permanent and binding form of Council action and may be changed or repealed only by a subsequent ordinance. Ordinances normally become effective five days after they are published in the City's official newspaper (Seattle Times).

All City laws are enacted through ordinances; hence the topics are very diverse from adopting the City budget to establishing speed limits to annexing property to accepting donations. Perhaps the type of ordinance that can require the most public involvement are those which deal with land-use regulations and recommendations from the Hearing Examiner or Planning Commission.
